



 - 1 minimal problem
 - 2 mild problem
 - 3 moderate
 - 4 severe


Updated 2001

Part 5 Hoehn and Yahr Staging

Stage 0

No Sign of Disease

Stage 1

Unilateral disease

Stage 1.5

Unilateral plus axial

Stage 2

 Bilateral without balance problems Stage 2.5

 Mild Bilateral with recovery on pull test

Stage 3

 Mild to moderate bilateral, some postural instability, physically independent

Stage 4

 Severe Disability, still able to walk or stand unassisted

Stage 5

 Wheelchair bound or bedridden unless aided

Part 6 Schwab and England Activities of Daily Living Scale

100%

 Completely independent, unaware of any difficulties

90%

 Completely independent, Some chores might take longer

80%

Chores take twice as long.
 Conscious of difficulty and slowness

70%

• Not completely independent. Can do most chores but very slow.

60%

 Can do chores but exceedingly slow and with errors, some are impossible 50%

 More dependent. Needs help, Difficulty with everything

40%

 Very dependent. Can do few chores alone.

30%

• With effort, occasionally does a few chores. Much help needed

20%

 Nothing alone. Can be a slight help. Severe invalid..

10%

•Totally dependent. Complete invalid






PDRS Trends


